VISOR visit to Blenheim Palace Wednesday - 20th September 2023



We assembled early at the Wellbeing Centre in Twickenham on a drizzly windy September morning frustrated a little by the fact that the previous day had been a warm sunny Indian summer September day.

Our members, including 4 new members, climbed aboard the accessible comfortable coach for the hour and a bit journey to the 18th Century only non - royal palace in the UK. Despite the rain, we arrived in good time and good spirits. As we reached the parking area the rain eased off. It was a little distance from this area to the palace building so, after receiving entry arm bands, some members opted for walking along the drive up to the palace, others - including my lazy self, awaited buggy transport provided for visitors

Sadly, the gardens were closed to visitors on this day due to the weather conditions and health and safety

concerns. Nevertheless, some views were possible from inside the palace.

We started in the stables café before embarking on the discovery of the main building's delights. The stables were extremely well maintained and, although no live horses were around, a life-size wicker horse was stabled next to a small open coach occupied by a young visitor probably acting out the role of Sarah Churchill, the first lady of the palace.

Moving to the main building we were able to get an audio tour which provided not only a description of the magnificent state room and other rooms but also an insight into the lives of the various Dukes of Marlborough and their families from the 1st Duke (John Churchill) to the current Duke - the 12th (Charles James Spencer-Churchill). The palace is still occupied in one wing by the current Duke and the family. Thus, part of the palace was available to visit at extra cost. We did not avail ourselves of this opportunity.

I was personally overwhelmed by the amazing quantity of paintings covering nearly all wall space and the some 300 years of family portraits, historic events and artistic treasures. There was a particular interesting exhibition of the life and times of Sir Winston Churchill on the ground floor, after all, he had been born here.

The usual visit to the shop followed then back to the buggies to rejoin our coach for the journey back to Twickenham.

Overall, I think everyone enjoyed the day despite the inclement weather. Thought might be given to a revisit to include the gardens.
